

The Second Lesson: James 2:1-10, 14-17

My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favoritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet," have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you? You do well if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and

one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

Holy Gospel: Mark 7:24-37, standing

Presider The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go—the demon has left your daughter." So she went home, found the child lying on the bed, and the demon gone.

Then he returned from the region of Tyre, and went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, in the region of the Decapolis. They brought to him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they begged him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, and put his fingers into his ears, and he spat and touched his tongue. Then looking up to heaven, he sighed and said to him, "Ephphatha," that is, "Be opened." And immediately his ears were opened, his tongue was released, and he spoke plainly. Then Jesus ordered them to tell no one; but the more he ordered them, the more zealously they proclaimed it. They were astounded beyond measure, saying, "He has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak."






The Invitation to Communion

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Liturgical Lesson

<u>Prayers of the People</u>

Through the Last Day after Pentecost on November 24, 2024, we will use Prayers of the People written by Bishop Geralyn Wolf. From 1996 - 2005, Bishop Wolf wrote intercessions for the House of Bishops. Later, she composed the intercessions we are using; these intercessions are keyed to the themes of the Revised Common Lectionary. Since these prayers are aligned with our readings and Psalms, they will change each Sunday during the remaining weeks of Ordinary Time.

In her introduction to the body of her intercessions, Bishop Wolf offers us the following guidance about Prayers of the People:

First and foremost, the intercessions, or Prayers of the People, are prayers. We offer God the concerns we hold in common not only with our own communities but also with the wider Anglican Communion and the global family. They speak of our entire dependence upon God, and our faith that through the death and resurrection of Christ, all things become possible. We invite God's will to reshape our own, and even though we may not receive what we ask for, we trust that we will receive all that is necessary to live a life empowered by faith.

A few words of caution: Intercessions are prayers, not notices: they are public, not private or personal revelation; they are communal in scope, not an opportunity to advocate a particular political conviction, or to take sides on an issue. One of the chief goals of liturgical prayer is to unite us in Christ, who calls us into the love of the Godhead.

It is inappropriate for a member of the parish to interpolate some particular concern of the congregation into an intercession, as it distracts from the flow and can distort the intention of the petition. Once again, this is why each set of intercessions invites those worshiping to add their own petitions at the end.

After completing our Year with the Bible program, we thought praying intercessions aligned with Scripture would be especially meaningful. We hope they enrich your worship experience at St. John's.
