Holy Gospel Luke 19:28-40

Presider The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

After telling a parable to the crowd at Jericho, Jesus went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.'" So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" They said, "The Lord needs it." Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying,

"Blessed is the king

who comes in the name of the Lord!





People: Risen Lord, be known to us in the breaking of the Bread.



THE PASSION OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO LUKE

The congregation is seated for the Passion of Christ. The congregation reads the parts indicated for them.

NARRATOR Then the assembly rose as a body and brought Jesus before Pilate. They

began to accuse him, saying,

PEOPLE "We found this man perverting our nation, forbidding us to pay taxes to

the emperor, and saying that he himself is the Messiah, a king."

NARRATOR Then Pilate asked him,

PEOPLE "Are you the king of the Jews?"

NARRATOR He answered,

JESUS "You say so."

NARRATOR Then Pilate said to the chief priests and the crowds,

PEOPLE "I find no basis for an accusation against this man."

NARRATOR But they were insistent and said,

PEOPLE "He stirs up the people by teaching throughout all Judea, from Galilee

where he began even to this place."

NARRATOR When Pilate heard this, he asked whether the man was a Galilean. And

when he learned that he was under Herod's jurisdiction, he sent him off to Herod, who was himself in Jerusalem at that time. When Herod saw Jesus, he was very glad, for he had been wanting to see him for a long time, because he had heard about him and was hoping to see him perform some sign. He questioned him at some length, but Jesus gave him no answer. The chief priests and the scribes stood by, vehemently accusing him. Even Herod with his soldiers treated him with contempt and mocked him; then he put an elegant robe on him, and sent him back to Pilate. That same day Herod and Pilate became friends with each other; before this they had been

enemies.

Pilate then called together the chief priests, the leaders, and the people, and

said to them.

PEOPLE "You brought me this man as one who was perverting the people; and

here I have examined him in your presence and have not found this man guilty of any of your charges against him. Neither has Herod, for he sent him back to us. Indeed, he has done nothing to deserve death. I will

therefore have him flogged and release him."

NARRATOR Then they all shouted out together,

PEOPLE "Away with this fellow! Release Barabbas for us!"

NARRATOR (This was a man who had been put in prison for an insurrection that had

taken place in the city, and for murder.) Pilate, wanting to release Jesus,

addressed them again; but they kept shouting,

PEOPLE "Crucify, crucify him!"

NARRATOR A third time he said to them,

PEOPLE "Why, what evil has he done? I have found in him no ground for the

sentence of death; I will therefore have him flogged and then release

him."

NARRATOR But they kept urgently demanding with loud shouts that he should be

crucified; and their voices prevailed. So Pilate gave his verdict that their demand should be granted. He released the man they asked for, the one who had been put in prison for insurrection and murder, and he handed

Jesus over as they wished.

As they led him away, they seized a man, Simon of Cyrene, who was coming from the country, and they laid the cross on him, and made him carry it behind Jesus. A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were beating their breasts and wailing for

him. But Jesus turned to them and said,

JESUS "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and

for your children. For the days are surely coming when they will say,

'Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never nursed.' Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'Fall on us'; and to the hills, 'Cover us.' For if they do this when the wood is green, what will

happen when it is dry?"

(At the mention of the place called the Skull, all should stand, as able.)

NARRATOR Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with

him. When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Then

Jesus said,

JESUS "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing."

NARRATOR And they cast lots to divide his clothing. And the people stood by, watching;

but the leaders scoffed at him, saying,

PEOPLE "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his

chosen one!"

NARRATOR The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, and

saying,

PEOPLE "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!"

NARRATOR There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews."

One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying,

PEOPLE "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!"

NARRATOR But the other rebuked him, saying,

PEOPLE "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of

condemnation? And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing

wrong."

NARRATOR Then he said,

PEOPLE "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

NARRATOR He replied,

JESUS "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

NARRATOR It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three

in the afternoon, while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the temple

was torn in two. Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said,

JESUS "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."

NARRATOR Having said this, he breathed his last. When the centurion saw what had

taken place, he praised God and said,

PEOPLE "Certainly this man was innocent."

NARRATOR And when all the crowds who had gathered there for this spectacle saw

what had taken place, they returned home, beating their breasts. But all his acquaintances, including the women who had followed him from Galilee,

stood at a distance, watching these things.

Now there was a good and righteous man named Joseph, who, though a member of the council, had not agreed to their plan and action. He came from the Jewish town of Arimathea, and he was waiting expectantly for the kingdom of God. This man went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Then he took it down, wrapped it in a linen cloth, and laid it in a rock-hewn tomb where no one had ever been laid. It was the day of Preparation, and the sabbath was beginning. The women who had come with him from Galilee followed, and they saw the tomb and how his body was laid. Then they returned, and prepared spices and ointments.

On the sabbath they rested according to the commandment.

A profound silence is observed.

Introducing The New Rector The Rev. Dr. Elaine Ellis Thomas

The Vestry of St. John's Episcopal Church, Essex, has called The Rev. Dr. Elaine Ellis Thomas to be the congregation's next full-time rector, effective July 1, 2025.

The Rev. Dr. Elaine Ellis Thomas has been the rector of All Saints, Hoboken, in the Diocese of Newark, NJ, since 2018. A passionate preacher and follower of Jesus, she brings extensive experience in parish ministry in a variety of settings. She is also skilled in organization management, conflict mediation, and global reconciliation ministries, and is excited about partnering with the people of St. John's as we move into the future together.

Elaine served at St. Paul's Memorial Church in Charlottesville, Virginia and was an organizing figure in the clergy response to the white supremacist events in the summer of 2017. She attended Berkeley Divinity School at Yale and was ordained in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, prior to which she was the director of Human Resources for Episcopal Community Services in Philadelphia, managing roughly half of the \$10-million budget and serving as a member of the strategic leadership team. She was also an accomplished organist and choirmaster.

As a public theologian, Elaine convenes the Hoboken Clergy Coalition, is chaplain of the Hoboken Fire Department, and a member of the boards of the Hoboken Shelter and the Jubilee Center. She has served as president of the Standing Committee, attended the 80th & 81st General Conventions of the Episcopal Church, and was a member of the Presiding Officers' Working Group on Truth-Telling, Reckoning, and Healing which led to the creation of several churchwide bodies exploring how the Church heals the wounds of our history.

Elaine and Tim, a leadership consultant, have been married for almost 26 years. Their daughter Rachel lives in the Philadelphia suburbs, and Seth, their son, died by suicide in 2009. She and Tim share their household with their 140-pound Great Pyrenees, Ella, and both enjoy baseball, traveling, and going on adventures together.
